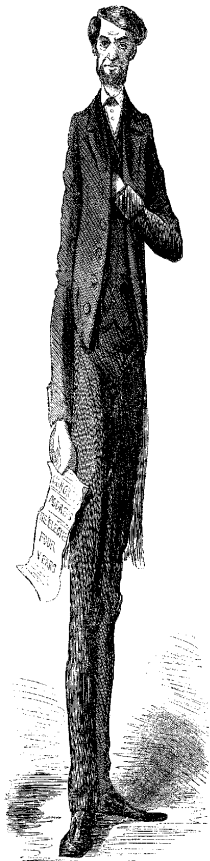

Typefaces

Note that all typefaces were designed after original specimens. Some therefore contain only uppercase letters, some do not feature certain special characters. All have a slightly smudged or worn out look, as can be expected from letters that see service on old hand presses and are blackened, at least in the confederacy, with shoe polish rather than with printer's ink.



The Fonts

Type No. 1

This is the most commonly used text face. Use it for any type of block text. This font remains legible even at small point sizes. Most of this booklet is set in Type No. 1

TYPE NO. 2

This Font is the Caps-only version of Type 1. In addition, its characters are more distorted than those of Type No. 1 to keep the illusion of hand-printing at larger point sizes.

TYPE NOS. 3-5

Fonts 3-5 are Sans-Serif Display Types in three different weights. They make splendid headlines! Caps and numerals only.

TYPE NO. 6

This font is a pure headline typeface and should not be used for paragraph text.

TYPE NO. 7

Similar to No. 6, but bolder. Also excellent for headlines. This font is often found on broadsides. Using a graphic program that allows you to stretch and distort fonts, you can achieve many interesting effects.

Type No. 8

One of the most popular bold text fonts of the 1850's and 60's, this font is well-suited for large-scale paragraph text, as well as Newspaper-style paragraph text.

Type No. 9

This font is the italic companion to Type No. 8 and adds accents to large-scale paragraph text. It is most commonly used in conjunction with Type No. 8.

TYPE NO. 10

A heavy display font with great impact in single line designs. Try printing this font in different colors for added effect.

TYPE NO. 11

Similar to Type No. 10, but less bold, this font lends itself to short blocks of text on large-scale projects.

Type No. 12

This font presents an elegant and refined typeface for more formal, higher-quality printing. It should not appear on the same page as some of the other, rougher, fonts.

TYPE NO. 13

This type is often found on official documents. The lines were not only decorative, but made it hard to forge text printed in this typeface. It is not the easiest font to read, use it sparingly.

TYPE FOURTEEN

A true "Western Style" Typeface - use it to print large signs or as a single headline on broadsides.

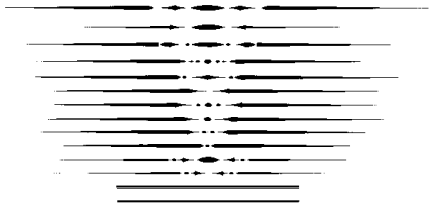

CURRENT EVENTS

Lincoln's message was the result of an intrigue by two of Burnside's officers, Brigadier General John Newton and John Cochrane of Franklin's grand division. Late in December, they had traveled to Washington to complain about Burnside to their Congressmen. But the two generals, neither of whom had a reputation for brilliance, had overlooked the fact that Congress adjourns for the holidays. Most of the Representatives were back in their home districts. Cochrane was a former congressman, which made the blunder all the more remarkable, but he compensated for it by arranging an appointment with Secretary of State William Seward. Seward in turn arranged for the generals to see the President.

COMMUNITY UPDATE

Lincoln's message was the result of an intrigue by two of Burnside's officers, Brigadier General John Newton and John Cochrane of Franklin's grand division. Late in December they had traveled to Washington to complain about Burnside to their Congressmen. But the two generals, neither of whom had a reputation for brilliance, had overlooked the fact that Congress adjourns for the holidays. Most of the

Representatives were back in their home districts. Cochrane was a former Congressman and General in Chief Halleck also lacked the confidence of the army and the country, and Lincoln should think about replacing them.

The President was not prepared for all this, and he asked Burnside for time to think. Burnside went back to his headquarters, and Lincoln turned to Halleck for advice as to the army's next move. He wrote the general in chief a letter, asking him to go down to Fredericksburg and convince Burnside's side of an order to Fredericksburg.
